



design of large-scale sample surveys.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE COLLEGE

PRASANTA CHANDRA MAHALANOBIS MAHAVIDYALAYA, BARANAGAR (formerly Bon-Hooghly College of Commerce) was established in 1965 as an evening Commerce College affiliated to the University of Calcutta. A brief history of the college is as follows:

Nascent Phase:

The idea of an evening Commerce College, a dream of many an educated person of the Baranagar-Kamarhati area, became reality through untiring efforts of a few educationists and persons interested in education and social development. Public donations and charities on the one hand and voluntary services rendered by teachers of the college on the other were the driving force for the



college to go ahead and grow.

The area where the college is situated, though adjacent to Kolkata, is a part of the greater Baranagar-Kamarhati Industrial Belt of West Bengal. There was no evening Commerce College in the vast area from Tallah to Barrackpore (a linear distance of about 20 kilometers) inhabitated by over 25 lakhs of people. The area has also the highest concentration of uprooted (refugees) people of which a sizeable number belong to Scheduled Castes community.

In the beginning, the college had no building of its own. With special permission from the State Government, classes were held from 5.15p.m. to 9p.m. in the premises of Brahmananda Keshab Chandra College, a Govt. sponsored Day College for Arts and Science.

The College was established as an evening Commerce College with a view to offering opportunity for higher education to those who were i) engaged in petty jobs in local factories, shops and various establishments but wanted to pursue their studies further for a change-over, ii) who were unemployed and on the look-out for jobs, iii) who were engaged in small business but aspired to be educated in Commerce to solve their professional problems relating to accounting, taxation, marketing etc.

Struggling Phase:

As the college started imparting knowledge to first generation learners, everything turned out satisfactorily. But unfortunately, during the seventies it had to face two serious problems: persistent load-shedding continuing for two/three hours at a stretch, and the Naxalite imbroglio. The problem of load-shedding was somehow tackled by installing petromaxes in the class rooms. But the then political unrest made it hardly possible to hold classes in the evening. Moreover, the roll strength dwindled alarmingly. As a result the college authority almost came to the conclusion that it was time to wind up. However, in the late seventies, the college limped back to normalcy.

Development Phase:

During the eighties we embarked upon giving our institution a new lease of life. Permanent teaching posts in Commerce, English, Bengali and Mathematics were created.

Permanent teaching posts in Commerce, English, Bengali and Mathematics were created and approved by the Government. This made us self-sufficient to teach Honours Course in one or two

commerce subjects. So we sought permission from the appropriate authority to teach Honours in Accountancy and the University of Calcutta granted our prayer. These new developments brought the problem of accommodation to the fore. The fact was that we had no building of our own. In spite of our continuous and sincere efforts no Building Grant could be obtained from the University Grants The commission commission. repeatedly turned down our



appeals on the pretext that the College had not ten permanent teaching staff. Thus, having failed to secure any grant whatsoever either from the U.G.C. or from the State Government, we were at a loss as to what to do because our own resources at that time were too inadequate to venture on an ambitious Building project on the land allotted by Central Government and sold to us by the State Government. With voluntary donations from students, teachers, non-teaching staff and also with the meager resources we had in the college fund the ground floor of the institution comprising three classrooms and staircase was constructed somehow. In the second half of the nineties we approached the State Government to release a substantial amount of grant to

complete the remaining part of the first project of our college building. This time the State Government responded positively to our appeal and released a grant of Rs. 26 lakhs. In the mean time, we also received some grants from MP and MLA LAD funds.

In this way, we enabled ourselves to complete three stories of the main block and the ground floor of the annexed block and to shift our college to our own building in the year 1999. From the year 2002-03, we changed the working hours of our college from the evening to the day shift for better teaching-learning facilities. Moreover, from the academic session 2003-04 we introduced faculties in arts and science by opening Honours course in Geography (self financing) along with general subjects like Sociology and Education. Honours courses were introduced in Sociology and Education the following year. This situation called for changing the name of the college as it was no longer just a commerce college. So to pay tribute to Prof. P. C. Mahalanobis, the great pioneer statistician and founder of Indian Statistical Institute, our college was renamed Prasanta Chandra Mahalanobis Mahavidyalaya. Gradually Honours courses were opened in Mathematics, Economics, Bengali, English, Philosophy and Food & Nutrition. Chemistry and Computer Science was also introduced as general subjects to offer the students a better combination. From the academic session 2017-18 college has introduced four subjects such as Physics, History, Political Science and Human Development as general papers. From 2018-19 Computer Science Honours courses was started. From the academic session 2019-20 Honours courses are introduced in Political Science, History and Human Development Now our college owns a four-storey twoblock building and has become a multi-faculty degree college offering Honours courses of study in 14 subjects.

SALIENT FEATURES OF PRASANTA CHANDRA MAHALANOBIS MAHAVIDYALAYA

Location

The college stands nearly two kilometres away from Sinthee More, Baranagar. Barangar Road Railway Station (Dunlop Bridge) is less than a kilometre away. Accessible by both road and rail, the college, located beside the beautiful Bon-Hooghly Lake, is a natural choice for students not only from Baranagar-Kamarhati locality but also from some parts of Howrah and Hooghly districts.



Subjects Offered

The college offers Honours courses in Accounting and Finance, English, Bengali, Philosophy, Education, Sociology, Geography, Mathematics, Economics, Food & Nutrition, Computer Science, History, Political Science and Human Development and Chemistry and Physics as General Subjects.

Faculties

The college can boast of highly motivated teachers with outstanding academic excellence since its inception. The faculty at present comprises dedicated teachers with brilliant academic results.

Academic Results

Catering mainly to the economically weak and average students, the college holds no entrance tests. Students are admitted on the basis of on-line application and merit list, the cut-off

marks for admission is as per minimum norms set by the University. Considering that many students are first generation learners, the academic results are exceptionally satisfactory.

Fee Structure

Considering the economic status of a large section of students, the college has kept its fee structure for different Honours and General courses at a very reasonable level.

Infrastructure and Administration

Total area of the college is 1 acre out of which constructed area stands on 2,448 sq. mtrs. Ours is a three storied building with two wings arranged with furnished classrooms, Administrative buildings, laboratories, Computer laboratory, digital class room, well-equipped library, office, multi-gym, Women's hostel, canteen, students' union room, separate common room for boys and girls. Our play ground is of medium size. In the eastern side of the building there is the cycle stand for the students and staff. Though the common rooms are inadequate in the context of increasing roll strength, arrangements for Table Tennis, Carom and Chess are there. Library is equipped with more than 18000 books, journals etc. The library reading room is adequately spacious. All the departments have separate departmental room. Our library, administrative office if fully computerized with efficient and devoted staff.

- **E- Learning -** While digital intelligence was already being used as additional support when the campus was open, it has now become imperative for a smoother teaching-learning process. In a post-Covid world, our teachers and administration have adapted e-learning procedures to cater better to the students.

Google Classrooms, official email IDs and whatsapp groups are operated by teachers and departments to disseminate academic information and reading materials. We hold online interactive sessions and classes via Google Meet/online audiovisual interfaces, and other aides such as audio, video lectures and YouTube are also used liberally as means of keeping records for future use by the students.

FUTURE PLAN OF ACTION

In the programmes of NSS, people are made aware of pollution. We make them know about the benefits of plantation, environmental cleanliness and so on. The college authority takes constant care regarding cleanliness of the whole campus as well as developing a general environmental consciousness among those who are associated with the college. All



associated with the college are very much sincere about conservation of energy. In future college will take more effective concern for conservative of energy. Installation of a solar panel photo-voltaic system at the roof top is under process. Relating to controlling carbon level in the college, plantation programme is going on. There is a Waste Accumulation Area very carefully and specially constructed for disposing off the hazardous wastes. Construction of an auditorium is our future plan. Extension of college building for more classrooms is under process. In considering future activities, the college emphasizes specially on following grounds -

CURRICULUMS OF DIFFERENT COURSES OF STUDY OFFERED BY OUR COLLEGE

Choice-Based Credit System (CBCS)

From the Academic Session 2018-19 the University has introduced CBCS pattern of curriculum as per the guidelines of the UGC. Now an undergraduate course of three years is divided into six semesters, two semesters each in 1st year, 2nd year and 3rd year. The rules of CBCS is given here

REGULATIONS FOR Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) of WEST BENGAL STATE UNIVERSITY, BARASAT

The CBCS course will comprise of the following:

- **1. Core Course**: A course, which should compulsorily be studied by a candidate as a core requirement of the chosen discipline(s) is termed as a Core course.
- **2. Elective Course**: Generally a course which can be chosen from a pool of courses and which may be very specific or specialized or advanced or supportive to the discipline/ subject of study or which provides an extended scope or which enables an exposure to some other discipline/subject/domain or nurtures the candidate's proficiency/skill is called an Elective Course.
- **2.1 Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) Course:** Elective courses may be offered by the main discipline/subject of study is referred to as Discipline Specific Elective. The University may also offer discipline related Elective courses of interdisciplinary nature (to be offered by main discipline/subject of study).

2.2 Dissertation/Project:

An elective course designed to acquire special/advanced knowledge, such as supplement study/support study to a project work, and a candidate studies such a course on his own with an advisory support by a teacher/faculty member is called dissertation/project.

2.3 Generic Elective (GE) Course:

An elective course chosen generally from an unrelated discipline/subject, with an intention to seek exposure is called a Generic Elective. P.S.: A core course offered in a discipline/subject may be treated as an elective by other discipline/subject and vice versa and such electives may also be referred to as Generic Elective.

3. Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC):

The Ability Enhancement (AE) Courses will be of two kinds: Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC).

3.1 Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC):

Such courses are the courses based upon the content that leads to knowledge enhancement. These are mandatory for all disciplines e.g. i) Environmental Science, ii) English Communication/MIL Communication (MIL stand for Modern Indian Language).

3.2 Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC):

Such courses are value-based and/or skill-based and are aimed at providing hands-on-training, competencies, skills, etc.

These courses may be chosen from a pool of courses designed to provide value-based and/or skill-based knowledge.

The University also has plans for Introducing Research Component in Under-Graduate Courses at a later stage of the implementation process. (Project work/Dissertation is considered as a special course involving application of knowledge in solving / analyzing

/exploring a real life situation / difficult problem. A Project/Dissertation work would be of 6 credits. A Project/Dissertation work may be given in lieu of a discipline specific elective course.)

4. MINIMUM CRITERIA FOR DEGREE

4.1 Degree with Honours:

An undergraduate (B. Sc, B. A., B. Com.) degree with Honours in a discipline may be awarded if a student completes 14 core courses in that discipline, 2 Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC), minimum 2 Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) and 4 courses each from a list of Discipline Specific Elective and Generic Elective courses respectively.

4.2 General Degree

4.2.1 An undergraduate (B. Sc General) Program degree in Science disciplines may be awarded if a student completes 4 core courses each in three disciplines of choice, 2 Ability Enhancement

Compulsory Courses (AECC), minimum 4 Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) and 2 courses each from a list of Discipline Specific Elective courses based on three disciplines of choice selected above, respectively.

4.2.2 An Undergraduate (B. A. General, B. Com General) program degree in Arts (Humanities/ Social Sciences) / Commerce may be awarded if a student completes 4 core courses each in two disciplines of choice, 2 core courses each in English and MIL respectively, 2 Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC), minimum 4 Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC), 2 courses each from a list of Discipline Specific Elective courses based on the two disciplines of choice selected above, respectively, and two courses from the list of Generic Electives courses.

The credit(s) for each theory course/practical/tutorial/project/dissertation will be as per the details given in for B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. Honours (Table A), B.Sc. General Program (Table-B) and B.A./B.Com. General Program (Table C), respectively.

* Wherever there is a practical, there will be no tutorial and vice- versa.

- **5.** The University shall offer a number of choices of courses from different disciplines under Generic Elective and Discipline Specific Elective as per the availability of the courses/faculty at a particular time.
- **6.** The University will evolve a system/policy about Extra Curricular Activities/ General Interest and Hobby Courses/Sports/NCC/NSS/Vocational courses/related courses which shall be intimated in due course of time.
- **7.** A student can opt for more number of Elective and AE Elective courses than proposed under the model curriculum of the University as per UGC rules. However the total credit score earned will not exceed 160 credits for UG Honours and 140 credits for UG Program degree.
- **8.** A student admitted in a particular department must opt for Generic Elective offered by another department. i.e., a student admitted under B. Sc (Hons) in Zoology cannot opt for Generic Elective courses offered by the Department of Zoology.
- **9.** Although as per UGC rules, a student obtaining 24 credits in particular discipline has the minimum qualification for admission eligibility requirement for PG/ Technical courses in Indian Universities/Institutions, the University shall exercise and have the right to have admission criteria which is in addition to the said minimum eligibility criteria towards post graduate admission. The same will be fixed and determined by the respective post graduate admission body of the University.
- **10.** An Honours students will be eligible as per minimum eligibility criteria for post graduate in another discipline provided the student opts for Generic Elective of a particular subject in each semester to earn 24 credits in the concerned discipline.

11. DURATION OF COURSE

For all the students obtaining admissions under the Three Year Under-graduate Program under CBCS starting 2018-19, the period to complete the course will be a maximum 5 years from the year of admission in the first semester, provided the student has completed all requirements to become eligible for appearing in the University Examinations as per rules.

12. Mechanism of computation of work-load per week:

- i) 1 Credit = 1 Theoretical class of 1- hour duration
- ii) 1 Credit = 1 Tutorial class of 1- hour duration
- iii) 1 Credit = 1 Practical class of 2- hour duration

Semester duration: 15 weeks of direct teaching

13. MARKS DISTRIBUTION AND EVALUATION

13.1. Full marks for each course of

B.A./ B.Sc./ B.Com. (Hons.& Gen.), carrying 6 credits, will be 75

B.A./ B.Sc./ B.Com. (Hons. & Gen.), carrying 2 credits, will be 25

- 13.2 The University has allotted 20% of the internal marks towards regular attendance to ensure the presence of students in the classroom which is the fundamental concept of the CBCS system.
- 13.3 Marks distribution for Theoretical Courses (no practical component) will be as follows
- i) For a 6 credit course having 75 marks, 25 marks shall be assessed by the College (internal) and 50marks by the University (End Semester).
- ii) Out of the 25 marks allotted as internal evaluation the breakup of marks will be as follows 5 marks (20%) on attendance and 20 marks (80%) in the form of class test/ assignment/ seminar /any other method to be decided by the respective Board of Studies.
- iii) The marks (5) for attendance shall be allotted as

Attendance >90% = 5 marks

Attendance >80% but less than 90% = 4 marks

Attendance >75% but less than 80% = 3 marks

Attendance >70% but less than 75% = 2 marks

Attendance >60% but less than 70% = 1 mark

13.4 Marks distribution for Courses, having practical component will be as follows

For a 6 credit course having practical component the total marks will be distributed as Part A (Theory)

50 marks + Part B (Practical) 25 marks = 75 marks

Part A

- i) For a 4 credit theory course having 50 marks, 10 marks shall be assessed by the College (internal) and 40 marks by the University (End Semester).
- ii) Out of the 10 marks allotted as internal evaluation the breakup of marks will be as follows 2 marks (20%) on attendance and 8 marks (80%) in the form of class test/ assignment/ seminar /anyother method to be decided by the respective Board of Studies.
- iii) The marks (2) for attendance shall be allotted as

Attendance >90% = 2 marks

Attendance >60% but less than 90% = 1 mark

Part B

- i) For a 2 credit practical course having 25 marks, 15 marks shall be assessed by the College (internal) and 10 marks by the University (End Semester)/college (as end semester) evaluation.
- ii) Out of the 15 marks allotted as internal evaluation the breakup of marks will be as follows 3 marks (20%) on attendance and 12 marks (80%) in the form of continuous assessment of the practical classes /any other method to be decided by the respective Board of Studies.
- iii) The marks (3) for attendance shall be allotted as

Attendance >90% = 3 marks

Attendance > 75% but less than 90% = 2 marks

Attendance >60% but less than 75% = 1 mark

- iv) The End semester examination shall be in the form of a Grand Viva-voce/Laboratory note book evaluation/ hands on experiment/ demonstration/ any other method to be decided by the respective Board of Studies. However, the candidate shall be barred from appearing in the said end semester examination if atleast 60% of his/her practical assignments are not duly signed by the respective teacher in the college.
- v) For Core and DSE courses under the Honours program the end semester evaluation will be organized by the University but for GE courses under the Honours program and Core, DSE and GE courses under the general program the end semester evaluation will be organized by the college where the student is registered.
- 13.5 The pattern and the breakup of marks allotted for the question in the different examinations shall be finalized by the respective Board of Studies in the relevant subject. The University shall ensure that both objective and subjective questions are part of the evaluation system to assess the overall concept of the candidate.
- 13.6 For the AECC of 2 credits comprising of 25 marks, 5 marks (20%) have been allotted for regular attendance and 20 marks (80%) for End semester examination.
- i) The marks (5) for attendance shall be allotted as

Attendance >90% = 5 marks

Attendance >80% but less than 90% = 4 marks

Attendance >75% but less than 80% = 3 marks

Attendance >70% but less than 75% = 2 marks

Attendance >60% but less than 70% = 1 mark

- ii) The End Semester Examination for Environmental Science shall be in the form of Multiple Choice questions which shall be evaluated by the college. However, question papers will be sent centrally by the University. The evaluation can be either through OMR or conventional methods.
- iii) The End semester Examination of English/MIL communication shall be conducted by the college. The evaluation method is to be finalized after taking into account the course structure after due approval from the respective Board of Studies in the concerned subjects.
- 13.7 For the SEC of 2 credits comprising of 25 marks, 5 marks (20%) have been allotted for regular attendance and 20 marks (80%) for End semester examination.
- i) The marks (5) for attendance shall be allotted as

Attendance >90% = 5 marks

Attendance >80% but less than 90% = 4 marks

Attendance >75% but less than 80% = 3 marks

Attendance >70% but less than 75% = 2 marks

Attendance >60% but less than 70% = 1 mark

- ii) The End Semester Examination shall be conducted by the College. The evaluation method is to be finalized after taking into account the course and the facilities available after due approval from the respective Board of Studies in the concerned subject.
- 13.8 The University shall hold the end semester examinations in a centralized manner for the Core Courses (CC) and Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) courses and the evaluation of the answer scripts will also be done in a centralized manner.
- 13.9 The University shall hold the end semester examinations in a centralized manner for the Generic Elective (GE) courses and the evaluation of the answer scripts will be done internally by the respective colleges.

15. Pass Percentage and Promotion Rules for All the Under-Graduate Courses under Choice Based Credit System.

The following provisions shall be applicable to students admitted to the Three Year Undergraduate program under Choice Based Credit System (CBCS):

- **15.1** A student who appears in a semester examinations or who was eligible to appear in the semester examinations but remains absent in any or all the courses of the said semester, shall move on to the next semester irrespective of his/her result in the said examinations. This will only be applicable up to the 4th semester examination.
- **15.2** A student who has obtained at least 40% in all the courses in theory examination (including internal assessment/ project work) and practical examination separately conducted in the different semester examinations shall be promoted to the next semester without any backlog.
- **15.3** A student who has not obtained at least 40% in all the courses in theory examination (internal assessment/ project work) and practical examinations separately, conducted in the different semester examinations shall be promoted to the next semester with previous uncleared backlog courses. However, the candidate must clear all his backlog courses before he is promoted to the final 6thsemester. In other word, a student cannot be promoted to the 6th semester if he has not cleared all his previous courses.
- **15.4** Students who do not fulfill the promotion criteria mentioned above shall be declared fail. However, they shall have the option to retain the marks in the courses in which they have passed. **15.5** If a student has secured the minimum number of credit necessary for the relevant degree taking together all the courses in theory examination (including internal assessment/ project, wherever applicable) and practical exam separately till the end of the third year, i.e., upto the end of the VIth semester, then she/he shall be awarded the degree in which the student has been admitted.
- 15.6 A student who wants to re-appear for clearing backlog in a course will have to do so only when the corresponding course is offered/ evaluated in the next semester under regular examination procedure. A student failing in any Semeter examination will have to appear for clearing the backlog when the same semester examination is held next year and so on. However, the internal assessment/internal marks will remain unaltered.

16. Re-appearance for improvement

16.1 A student may re-appear in any theory course prescribed for a semester, on foregoing

in writing her/his previous performance in the course/s concerned. This can be done in the immediate subsequent semester examination only (for example, a student reappearing in course prescribed for semester I examination may do so along with subsequent semester III examination and not along with courses for semester V).

16.2 This option of reappearance for improvement will be available only once per course against prescribed fees. All request for reappearance for improvement must be made within 15 days of publication of result after which no such request will be entertained.

16.3 A candidate who has cleared the 6th semester examination but wants to apply for reappearancefor improvement in the 6th semester course in the immediate subsequent semester when the course being offered under regular study must forgo in writing his/her previous performance in thecourse concerned within the prescribed time period of 15 days. However, candidates under this category will not be allowed to join in any postgraduate course under this university.

16.4 In the case of re-appearance in course, the candidate will have to forgo his earlier marks obtained and the result will be prepared on the basis of candidate's latest performance in the examinations

16.5 In the case of a candidate, who opts to re-appear in any course/s under the aforesaid provisions, on surrendering her/his earlier performance but fails to reappear in thecourse/s concerned, the marks previously secured by the candidate in the course/s in which she/he has failed to re-appear shall be taken into account while determining her/his result of the examination held currently.

16.6 Re-appearance in practical/internal assessment shall not be allowed. An exception to this willbe only applicable when the candidate decides to rejoin the entire semester by taking fresh admission to the relevant semester after paying necessary admission fees as prescribed.

16.7 There shall be no supplementary examinations for any courses.

16. Letter grades and grade points

A student who becomes eligible for the degree will be categorized on the basis of the combined result of semester I to semester VI examinations under CBCS on a 10 point grading system with the following

Issue of Transcripts: Based on the grades earned, a Grade Certificate shall be issued to all the registered students by the University after every semester and a consolidated transcript indicating the performance in all semesters. The Grade Certificate will display the course details (code, title of the course, number of credits, grade secured) along with SGPA of each semester and CGPA earned based on overall six semesters.

Honours Courses:

- Applications are to be made on on-line basis following the minimum norms as set by the
 University. Merit list will be prepared on the basis of aggregate of best four subjects
 (excluding EVS) and the subject/related subject in which the student intends to study
 Honours. Course.
- Candidates passing H.S. or equivalent exams, from various Open Schools (except from National Institute of Open Schooling) are not eligible for admission.
- Candidates who had vocational course at the H.S. or equivalent exams, will have no option but to do B.A. (General) course only.
- Candidates who had not studied Geography (Economic Geography not considered) at 10+2 levels are not eligible to take up Honours in Geography.
- Candidates who had not studied Chemistry at 10+2 levels are not eligible to take up Honours in Food & Nutrition and to take up Chemistry as one of the General subjects in B.Sc. (General) course.

General Courses:

• As per University norms on the basis of merit list prepared from on-line applicants.

ADMISSION PROCEDURE

Students are advised to apply through on line process at the college portal available at website named, "www.pcmm.edu.in" after the publication of the results of the W.B. Council/ISC/CBSE. or equivalent examination. Selected applicants are required to secure their admission on full payment of the requisite fees through this portal. Original Documents will be verified on the first day of the Academic Session as notified in the website. If the documents are found fake on verification the admission will be cancelled.

Documents Required at the time of Verification:

Each admitted student must produce the following documents at the time of verification :

1) The original mark-sheet of the last qualifying examination along with two attested photo copies of the same.

(Attestation is to be done only by the Headmaster/Headmistress of the school last attended.)

- 2) The original Admit Card of Madhyamik/Equivalent examination along with two attested photo copies of the same.
 - (Attestation is to be done only by the Headmaster/Headmistress of the concerned school.)
- 3) Two copies of recent passport-size coloured photograph.
- 4) The scheduled caste / tribe / OBC certificate in original along with two attested photo copies of the same (only for SC/ST/OBC candidates). (Attestation is to be done by the Headmaster/Headmistress of the concerned school.)


